Lesson Summary

In these lessons, students choose a personal quality from the factors they identified as those that



contribute to success of leaders of change. They then create a poster for a display titled "Be an Effective Leader of Change" to help other students in their school understand the personal qualities they need to effectively lead change, and to inspire students in their school to become leaders of change.

For our submissions, we'll be looking for students to clearly identify a topic or issue and a call to action.
